The Making of the Opportunity Quilt

Choosing a pattern and designing the quilt was the first of

many challenges. There were five different quilt designs that the Quilt Show Chairs had to choose from. The votes came in and Wyoming Valley Cabin design was chosen.

Why these blocks set in this pattern? What block or quilt was popular 30 years ago? Log Cabin of course. How could this be made into a fun quilt that had a story to tell of the past?

Color and setting of course: Red in the centers represents love in the home and the different reds that were turned in shows the different homes and cultures that make up the area and our guild. Gold in the centers represents the light is always on, visitors always welcome. Again the different golds represents the hospitality and friendships we have within our guild. The different shades of neutrals represent the different kinds of dirt there are in this fair state from clay, sand, shale to granite. The different blues are the night skies, mountains, lakes, and denim that the early settlers wore and that the cowboys, farmers and ranchers still wear today.

The Wyoming Valley block, even though it was made to honor Wyoming Valley Pennsylvania back in the early 1930s, I thought was the perfect block to represent the valleys we have here in Wyoming. In each valley is some form of water whether a pond, small creek, river, reservoir or a dry creek bed and each valley has its own vegetation with the various greens that you provided. Even though there are different greens, in each block there is a green that is constant throughout the state and time of year and that is the green of the blue spruce and the pinion pine trees. Again the neutrals represent the earth but the white represents snow which can be at anytime or the stars that shine brightly at night.

The flying geese were added to represent the sportsman that love this state for it's hunting and fishing. The golden colors of the geese were chosen for the aspens that turn in the fall, the harvest of the crops, and the many hunting seasons. The setting of the blocks is "Field and Furrows" in honor of the farmers and ranchers. The quilting design "Cheyenne Feathers", designed by Patricia Ritter, was used to honor those that came before us, our state capitol and our guild name.

Lastly the black center of the one log cabin represents freedom and equal rights. Legend is that if a slave saw a log cabin quilt hanging and it had black centers or a block with a black center that it was a safe house. Wyoming would have been a free state at that period in history and it represented equal rights by being the first state to allow women the right to vote. May it continue to be so.
